I suffer with involuntary eye movements, my eyes flicker constantly which has a big impact on my concentration, if I concentrate for so long I need to have a break as I can veer off completely.

I have a guide dog (I have had 3 in the past), and I also have a man who comes out to me and runs the guide dog for me, when I need to learn a new route someone from guide dogs will come out and teach the route, my guide dog also remembers certain routes and he will also guide me around dangers on the roads like potholes etc. I have to focus on landmarks when I am out otherwise I end up in the wrong place, I am very confident when asking people for directions when I am out if I cannot remember them.

I can suffer with issues with fatigue and aching to the eyes, changes to lights can have an impact on my vision, I have a 6th of my vision which worsens with certain lights. I have been diagnosed as being partially sighted. My eyes can close on my own, I find they are fatigued, I need aids to help me to read text and I also have computer assist, I also have the dark background with white print which is anti-glare, white screens hurt my eyes and can be very harsh to look at.

I suffer with blurred/greyness in my vision, this can be all of the time, when I am out walking, before I had a guide dog I would walk into things however he tends to guide me, I can however walk into things that are above the guide dogs level.
